What to Bring: Your dog, limited-slip collar or strong fixed collar (correction collars are not recommended for positive approach

training, however may be used if handler prefers), 4 foot (120cm) lead, plenty of soft treats (such as diced cooked

sausage) water and water bowl for your dog.

Venue: When you get to the venue (listed below), please register with the Rottweiler Club and pay your fee.

Restrictions: Please bring proof of vaccination to your first class.

Puppies must be at least 13 weeks of age.

Costs: \$5 per session, or \$20 for 5 sessions.

• Long lead (8 - 12 foot) for stay and recall exercises.

Basic Rules

All obedience participants are required to abide by the following rules:

- The use of pinch or prong collars is strictly prohibited.
- Dogs must be on lead at all times, unless otherwise director by your instructor.
- You must always clean up after your dog
- Have some means of tethering your dog, preferably by chain or cable, whether it be to your car or a secure dog-stake.
- Bring along water and a waterbowl for your dog.
- Never bring a sick dog to any event.
- ABUSE OF DOGS IS STRICTLY FORBIDDEN physical or verbal.
- Approach other dogs with caution Malamutes are not always going to be friendly towards each other or other breeds, particularly same sex.
- Bait may be used discretely dropped bait must be picked up immediately.
- Respect other dog's space and watch that you are keeping your dog at a reasonable distance from others at all times.

ALL WELCOME

Young, old, obedient or naughty dogs, we want to see them all there!

You do not need to be a member or have a registered Malamute to join in, other breeds also welcome.

Ebook by Ian Luke



Kimba is a gorgeous pet shop puppy. But her family is not prepared for the dog she grows up to be. What will happen to poor Kimba?

Follow Kimba's story as she travels the path of many irresponsibly impulse-purchased pets from cute and cuddly puppy to problem pet, dumped at the pound where she becomes one of the few lucky ones given a second chance.

Avoiding a Christmas Crisis!



Early summer in Victoria is a gloriously crazy time. The weather is completely unpredictable which makes life very entertaining for our pets. Today my cats are skipping around our sunny potted balcony garden and smelling delightful after playing chasey through the lemon Geranium. Tomorrow they might be shivering inside hiding from a hailstorm or flat out on the cool bathroom floor trying to escape the heat. Summer and the festivities that come with it can provide plenty of opportunities to play outdoors together ad spend some valued holiday hours spoiling our pets. On the other hand there are also a host of dangers that come with the changeable weather and the change in our routines over Christmas time.

Check out these lists to keep your pets out of danger

Parties can poison pets. What should you steer them away from?

- Chocolate can cause tummy upsets and seizures leading to death
- Onions can kill pets by their toxic effects on blood cells
- Grapes have unpredictable levels of toxicity in dogs
- Cooked bones can splinter and puncture important organs
- Fatty meats are a big no-no for dogs prone to pancreatitis
- Christmas baubles and party streamers can cause a bowel obstruction.

How do you reduce the risks faced in the garden, in parks and on holidays?

- Christmas Lilies cause renal failure in cats
- Snail bait and rat poisons can kill pets. The safest measure is not to use them at all
- Venomous snakes are active so keep dogs on leads near rivers and creeks
- Take a first aid kit with you to attend to minor injuries of both pets and people.

What are the best methods to prevent heat stroke?

- Don't leave pets unattended in cars
- Make sure there is excellent ventilation both indoors and in runs and kennels.
- Maintain a constant source of cool fresh drinking water that is always accessible
- Map out the shade patterns in your garden and provide extra shade where needed
- Provide cool surfaces to rest on.

Why do so many pets end up getting lost or injured on roads over summer?

- Changes in routines and an increase in visitors lead to doors and gates left open.
- Loud noises of parties, fireworks, thunderstorms and storms frighten some pets.
- If pets get out they face starvation, exposure, aggressive animals and cars.

Once you've checked the safety list I have one last piece of advice. Spoil your best friend rotten with good food, energetic focused playtime and plenty of mutual grooming!



The Underdog Training "So Your Dog" Series

So Your Dog Is Destructive

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Chewed Electrical cords? Missing socks? Garden and lawn excavations? Does this sound familiar! Does your dog redecorate your house and garden? While some dogs are naturally more destructive than others, there are ways to reduce your dog's destructive tendencies and at the same time, improve your relationship with your dog. There are a number of reasons why your dog may be destroying things. Identifying this reason is a vital part of resolving the problems you experience.

Why is my dog destructive?

- Lack of exercise. Many dogs that are destructive simply do not receive enough physical exercise.
- Lack of mental stimulation and training
- Anxiety and Separation Related Behaviour
- Boredom and lack of environmental enrichment
- Learned behaviour- each time the dog destroys something and enjoys doing so, it reinforces the behaviour
- Access is given to irresistible items!
- Weather changes and lack of sleeping areas- In Summer many dogs dig holes to find a cooler spot to sleep while in Winter or after rain, many dogs will dig as a result of the changing smell of the soil/ lawn.

How to Reduce your dog's Destruction!

- When does your dog become destructive? If the behaviour only occurs in your absence and the measures below do not improve the situation, your dog may be suffering from separation anxiety. If you believe this to be the case, please contact us and we can recommend the best professional for your situation.
- **Limit access!** This is particularly important with young dogs and puppies. When leaving your dog in an area, ensure there is nothing within reach that they could take or destroy.
- Increase your dog's physical exercise. Regardless of the cause of your dog's destructive behaviour, an increase in exercise is likely to be helpful. Try to provide further physical exercise by playing active games with your dog at home such as tug of war (with an appropriate toy) as well as increasing the duration and intensity of your dogs walks. If you lack the time to increase your dogs exercise, consider employing a walker to provide further exercise to your dog while you are at work. Breaking up your dog's day can be crucial-particularly for those full time workers with a solo dog.
- Train your dog! Going to obedience classes, taking up agility or teaching tricks at home will help to work your dog's brain. This is just as important as the provision of physical exercise and has the added advantage that you can always make the exercise more difficult without requiring additional time. Physical exercise does not have this advantage as it needs to increase in duration or intensity as the dog's fitness increases- if we were to rely on it alone to improve our dog's behaviour. Training should be ongoing for your dog- if they already know the basics; working on more advanced skills will not only help to stimulate them but will also improve your bond and relationship.
- Vary your routine. While we are often limited because of work and other commitments, varying your routine can assist dogs that anticipate particular events. When a dog anticipates and expects certain things to occur and they do not, they can become anxious and this can lead to destructive behaviour. By varying the routine, the dog does not develop these firm expectancies and is less likely to experience increasing anxiety. Try to walk and feed your dog at different times, vary when the dog is inside and outside etc.

- What does your dog have to stimulate them when they are in their backyard? While many dogs have toys, few dogs have toys that interact with them without a person's presence. Gather up all of your dog's toys and divide them into 2 or 3 groups- start rotating these groups every few days so that your dog regularly has a collection of 'new' toys to play with. In addition, you may want to consider purchasing some interactive treat balls, Nylabones and hanging toys that can hold your dog's interest even when you're not there to play. Reduce your dog's meals so that you can use their treat balls to feed them. Treat balls provide both mental and physical stimulation as your dog works hard to access the food inside. Does your dog enjoy safe rawhide chews, pigs ears or greenies chews? Try to find treats that will last your dog a number of hours rat her than those that are eaten quicklythis may take some experimenting.
- Provide a digging area- If your dog enjoys digging, set up an area with clean sand where toys and treats are semi buried. This will encourage your dog to fulfil their need to dig in an appropriate area. You may also wish to safely peg plastic mesh flat over your garden beds- with holes cut for your plants- to discourage digging in garden areas. Consider what your dog is bred for- many terriers will dig instinctually-rather than getting frustrated, accept that this is and will continue to be a part of them and you can direct it to an appropriate area.
- Does your dog steal? If your dog regularly takes inappropriate items when you are present he may be doing this as a way to get your attention. DON'T chase your dog when they do this- this creates a rewarding game that your dog will want to play regularly!! Instead teach your dog to approach you with something in their mouth-gently remove the item by squeezing either side of your dog's mouth until they relinquish the item 20-30 seconds later- redirect the dog to an item that they are allowed to chew and play with. If you need your dog to drop something urgently, rather than approach them, turn away from them and with or without an item to focus on, pretend you are having the most fantastic time- plenty of noise and movement is likely to get your dog to drop the object and come over to see what on earth you're so excited about! If you catch your dog AS they are trying to steal something, you need to quickly intervene- preventing the dog from picking up the item (grabbing a collar or a quick clap of the hands works for many dogs in this instance) and 20-30 seconds later, redirect the dog to an appropriate toy.
- Provide appropriate shelter and cool places to lie in Summer for your dog. Touch the areas where you think your dog will lie- if the surfaces are too hot for you to comfortably touchthey will be too hot for your dog to lay for more than a few moments!

Vice-President's report - Breed Welfare

The AMCV continues to be very active in the area of breed welfare which is of course one of the primary roles of our club as designated guardians of the breed.

Thank you to Anna for her work throughout the year in gaining and disseminating new information about health issues affecting our breed, and in addressing the numerous emails the club receives regarding health and behavioural problems.

Publicity and education has been ongoing with the AMCV attending one Pet Expo earlier in the year and also being present at the AMRAA fundraising walks. Thanks to Ian for ensuring club events and notifications are posted on the AMCV Facebook group which has been an excellent means of communicating the AMCV's activities to the wider community.

The number of Malamutes needing new homes has continued to be a major concern, particularly in NSW where there has been 20-30 dogs listed on the website for adoption at any given time throughout the year. There is an urgent need for foster homes and adoptees, so if anyone is able to help please contact Michele or AMRAA. The numbers of unwanted dogs in Victoria is not nearly as high but remains constant, however there is always the possibility that dogs in need in NSW can be transferred down to Victoria to ease their situation. A huge thanks to Michele for her hard work throughout the year with both the AMCV and AMRAA, and to all the AMRAA gang who do a great job dealing with a very large and difficult problem. Michele has also put in a lot of time and effort answering the many emails the AMCV receives regarding unwanted dogs, plus the occasional adoption enquiry, as well as ensuring that the dogs we have listed on the AMCV website is up to date. Thankfully Michele has renominated for this role as we would be lost without her help.

Health

Puppy & Referral Service Report

There have been no litters on the puppy register this year.

From the annual report of just AMRAA in 2012 – 2013 – for rescued dogs – NSW = 88, VIC = 21 and SA = 16. Total = 125 and that was just up to June 30th, a lot more have come in since. This amount does not include the significant amount that ABR in Qld also have rescued and rehomed. Also, NVSDR in Northern Victoria contributed to a considerable amount of Malamutes in need of a new home whilst they were still involved in rescue

Lost/abandoned and surrendered Malamutes has been consistently high for many months and AMRAA and other arctic rescues, such as ABR in Qld have been inundated with dogs in pounds needing rescue or either surrendered to them or directly to rescue over the last year, especially in our busiest state - NSW, where there is always a constant flow of dogs needing rescue throughout the year.

Tawnee who was rescued late last year was a MAJOR win for the AMCV/AMRAA liaison... for her as well as us. The Lost Dogs Home have always refused to work with rescue BUT were prepared to adopt her out to a representative of the AMCV for rehoming instead. I was very proud as the then new Referral Officer to have had the opportunity to save this poor, darling girl from the alternative she was faced with if I hadn't been able to appeal to them on behalf of the AMCV.

AMRAA are appealing for foster carers in NSW, SA, as well as VIC . If there is anyone who can assist in any way whatsoever, either by donating funds or goods, fostering, volunteering to transport, check out dogs at the pounds, etc or know of anyone who may be able to assist, especially in NSW – the help would be MOST welcomed and very much appreciated.

20 Things You Can Learn from Your Pets

1. Forget Multitasking

When dogs have a job to do, they give it their undivided attention. It turns out people should probably do the same. Stanford researchers found that attention and memory suffer in those who juggle work, email, and web-surfing, compared to those who focus on one task at a time. Other studies suggest employees actually lose time when multitasking.

2. Take Naps

You won't catch your pet going from dawn to dusk without any shut-eye. There's good evidence humans can benefit from catnaps, too. A study involving about 24,000 people indicates regular nappers are 37% less likely to die from heart disease than people who nap only occasionally. Short naps can also enhance alertness and job performance.

3. Walk Every Day

Whether you've got four legs or two, walking is one of the safest, easiest ways to burn calories and boost heart health. Taking regular walks can also help you:

- Fight depression.
- Lose weight.
- Lower your risk for type 2 diabetes.
- Lower the risk of breast and colon cancer.
- Keep your bones strong.
- Keep your mind sharp.

4. Cultivate Friendships

People are social animals, and friendships have measurable health benefits. Researchers in Australia followed 1,500 older people for 10 years. Those with the most friends were 22% less likely to die than those with the fewest friends.

5. Live in the Moment

Living in the moment may be one of the most important lessons we can learn from our pets. In a study called "A Wandering Mind Is an Unhappy Mind," Harvard psychologists conclude that people are happiest when doing activities that keep the mind focused, such as sex or exercise. Planning, reminiscing, or thinking about anything other than the current activity can undermine happiness.

6. Don't Hold a Grudge

Part of living in the moment is letting bygones be bygones. Let go of old grudges, and you'll literally breathe easier. Chronic anger has been linked to a decline in lung function, while forgiveness contributes to lower blood pressure and reduced anxiety. People who forgive also tend to have higher self-esteem.

7. Wag

OK, so maybe you don't have a tail. But you can smile or put a spring in your step when you're feeling grateful. Researchers have found a strong connection between gratitude and general well-being. In one study, people who kept gratitude journals had better attitudes, exercised more, and had fewer physical complaints.

8. Maintain Curiosity

According to a popular saying, curiosity may be hazardous to a cat's health. But not so for humans. Researchers have found that people who are more curious tend to have a greater sense of meaning in life. Other studies have linked curiosity to psychological well-being and the expansion of knowledge and skills.

9. Be Silly

Indulging in a little silliness may have serious health benefits. Cardiologists at the University of Maryland Medical Center found a stronger sense of humor in people with healthy hearts than in those who had suffered a heart attack. They conclude that "laughter is the best medicine" – especially when it comes to protecting your heart.

10. Make Time to Groom

Aside from the obvious health benefits of bathing and brushing your teeth, grooming can have a number of positive effects on your life. Good personal hygiene is vital to self-esteem. A tidy appearance can also help you get and maintain a job.













11. Drink Water When You're Thirsty

Dogs don't lap up sports drinks when they've been playing hard – and most people don't need to either. During a typical workout, drinking water is the best way to stay hydrated. Water gives your muscles and tissues critical fluid without adding to your calorie count. Be sure to drink more than usual on hot days or when you're sweating a lot.



The power of touch is nothing to sniff at. The Touch Research Institute at the University of Miami Miller School of Medicine has found massage therapy can ease pain, give the immune system a boost, and help manage chronic conditions like asthma and diabetes. The touch of a loved one may be even more powerful. In one study, married women experienced less anxiety over the threat of an electric shock when they held their husbands' hands.

13. Eat Fish

Most cats and dogs would trade kibble for a can of tuna any day. Luckily, you can choose to make fish a regular part of your diet. Salmon, tuna, trout, and other fatty fish are high in omega-3 fatty acids, which may reduce the risk of heart disease, high blood pressure, and arthritis. In addition, Rush University researchers found that people who eat fish at least once a week are 60% less likely to develop Alzheimer's disease.

14. If You Love Someone, Show It

Dogs don't play hard to get – when they love you, they show you. It's a good approach for people seeking to strengthen their relationships. A study published in the journal *Personal Relationships* suggests small, thoughtful gestures can have a big impact on how connected and satisfied couples feel.

15. Play

Goofing off is not just for kids and kittens. In his book, *Play*, Stuart Brown, MD, writes that playing is a basic human need along with sleeping and eating. Play enhances intelligence, creativity, problem-solving, and social skills. So take a cue from your pet and devote yourself to an activity that has no purpose other than sheer fun

16. Enjoy the Great Outdoors

A hike in the woods may be a dog's idea of bliss, but it has plenty of benefits for the human mind and body as well. Spending time outdoors can enhance fitness, increase vitamin D levels, and reduce stress. In children, playing in natural settings has also been linked to better distance vision, fewer ADHD symptoms, and better performance in school.

17. Be Aware of Body Language

Dogs are excellent at reading each other's intent from body language. Humans, not so much. While most of us do reveal our emotions through posture, speech patterns, and eye contact, other people generally aren't very good at reading those cues. People get better at decoding body language as they get older.

18. Stretch Often

Stretching will keep you limber, but the benefits don't stop there. In a 10-week study, volunteers who did no exercise other than stretching experienced surprising physical changes. Besides improving flexibility, they increased their muscle strength, power, and endurance. Although the study was a small one, the results suggest stretching may be a good alternative for people who have a condition that rules out traditional strength-training.

19. Seek Out Shade

When you're at the park, and your pooch is ready for a break, she'll probably find a nice shady spot to relax. Dermatologists recommend you follow suit, especially between the hours of 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. That's when you would soak up the most UV rays, particularly during late spring and early summer. While you're sheltered in the shade, it's a good idea to use a broad-spectrum sunscreen on exposed skin.

20. Stick to a Schedule

Pets like the consistency of a routine – they can't tell a Saturday from a Monday. The same goes for the human body clock. People sleep better if they go to bed and get up at the same time every day, even on weekends. Sticking to a consistent schedule for bathing, dressing, and eating can also improve the quality of sleep.
