# President's Message...

Welcome to the third edition of the Malamute Mail for 2015.

I see in the last issue we were welcoming in winter, but now a few months down the track we find ourselves again starting to get some warmer weather and summer will soon be upon us. Now is the time to start getting prepared for the heat, snakes, grass seeds & bushfires that summer may bring, particularly for those of us who live in more rural areas.

Congratulations to all the winners and placegetters, in particular Stuart Vanderpol for taking out the 1-dog class, Ash Blackwood winning the 2-dog class and Colin McPhan winning the 4-dog class. Thank you to Ian & Mel for the effort they put into making the sledding and weight pull events throughout the season a success, as well as to all those who pitch in and help our coordinators out.

The full results of the sledding and weight pull events and point score competitions are published elsewhere in this newsletter, with the awards to be presented at the AGM on Thursday 8 October. If you are the lucky recipient of an award it would be appreciated if you can be there on the night, however if you can't make it please nominate someone to accept the award on your behalf.

At the time of writing we have just had our Championship and Open Shows, so congratulations to Best in Show Supreme Ch Hamalek Rumble in the Jungle owned by Hayley & Rebekah French-Davis and Shelley Turner, and to the Runner Up in Show, Stuart Presland's Ch Darksky Southern Star under US judge Mrs Patricia Putman at our Championship Show, and Dean Gibbon's Nukabiitka Truly Sweet Georgia winning Best In Show under Ms Susie Baird at our Open Show, with Runner Up In Show awarded to S & M Turner and S Glasheen's Kataku The Company You Keep (AI). The full results and photos will be published in the next issue of the Malamute Mail.

A big thanks to our show secretaries and their assistants, Dale & Lorraine Green, Shelley Turner and Sharen McPhan, for all the work they put into organising these two shows, and to everyone who helped out on the day to ensure that everything ran smoothly with special mention of Colin McPhan and our ticket writer, Olive Singer. Thanks also to all those who donated sashes and trophies and supported our fundraising on the day which raised over \$300, and particularly to Canidae who sponsored our Championship Show. Holding two shows on the one day is a huge effort but the entries were good and it seems the entry at the Royal this year benefited from the move of our Championship Show back to September. Unfortunately there was insufficient interest in the lecture on canine anatomy by our US judge, Pat Putman, and having had the pleasure of speaking with her for just a short time I can't help but feel this was a missed opportunity. Instead, Pat has kindly provided us with some information and an article to share with the members which will be published in the next newsletter.

In this issue you will see an article regarding the successful prosecution of an unregistered Queensland breeder, Mr Peter Dykstra and his wife, who made false claims to puppy buyers about Hip dysplasia being caused by diet and not having any hereditary component. You may recall that Mr Dykstra had on several occasions in the past threatened to take the AMCV to court over the information on our website regarding the hereditary component of Hip dysplasia, which prompted us to send him a large list and several scientific journal articles as references in support of the information we provide. We were pleased to hear that this, along with the assistance to the prosecution provided by Ian Luke on behalf of the AMCV, contributed to charges being laid which was a wonderful and fitting outcome. Our Committee has undergone some changes throughout the year, most recently with the resignation of Kellie-Ann Bryson from her roles as Obedience Coordinator & Referral Officer for personal reasons. We thank Kellie for the time and effort she put into these roles over the past year and for her contribution to the club and Committee in a number of ways, including securing Canidae sponsorship for our State Cup sledding event and Championship Show. Being so close to the AGM these roles have not been filled, so we hope that someone will put their hand up at the AGM if they are interested in any of the roles for which we have not received any nominations. The list of nominations, award recipients and the AGM agenda are published in this newsletter.

We still have quite a few events coming up with a hike, fun walk, weight pull and the sledding training in October, then finishing up the year with our Christmas Fun day in late November. I hope to see many of you at these events, so come along if you can and enjoy your Mals!



**Weightpull Event Format & Schedule:** Events will be conducted as per AMCV Weight-Pulling rules – copies of the rules are available on the AMCV website at www.amcv.org.au or from the Weight-pull Co-ordinator.

Competitors are asked to arrive in plenty of time to register, weigh-in and organise equipment if necessary. There are weight pull harnesses available in a range of sizes that competitors can hire for the event (fees below).

\* NOTE – Events may be cancelled if forecast temperature on day of competition is over 25°C or in extreme weather conditions.

Events 1-5, including the ASTCV events on 28 June and 23 August, are included in the AMCV 2015 Annual Weight Pull Competition. Event 6 on 11 October 2015 is included in the 2016 annual competition.

**Registration, Weigh-in and Practice:** Competitors are asked to arrive in plenty of time to register, weigh-in and hire equipment if necessary. Competitors are welcome to practise in the weight-pull chute prior to commencement of the event. **LATE ENTRIES WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.** 

**Eligibility:** Any dog over 18 months of age (but not bitches in season) may compete in an AMCV weight-pull <u>event</u>, however please note that only purebred, ANKC-registered Alaskan Malamutes are eligible to compete for major prizes and annual awards at AMCV events, and the competing Malamute's registered name and registration number must be included on the entry form. Trophies or ribbons awarded to all class winners and placings (all breeds).

# CHANGE TO WEIGHT PULL EVENT FORMAT

The AMCV is trialling a new format for the weight pull events in which the handler / owner can opt to nominate a start weight which is based on the dog's weight as follows:

<36 kg class: maximum start weight 244 kg 36-45 kg class: maximum start weight 286 kg 45-55 kg class: maximum start weight 328 kg Open Class: maximum start weight 328 kg

The maximum start weights are based on the rules of the IWPA (International Weight Pull Association).

Note that these weights are <u>maximum</u> starting weights. Each dog may enter any round at or below the maximum weight in that class. If poor pulling conditions exist, the Chief Judge may adjust the starting weights lower to match the conditions.

#### **Annual Weightpull Competition**

Classes: < 36kg, 36kg – 45kg, 45kg - 55kg, Unlimited Eligibility For a dog to be eligible for the Annual Weightpull Competition awards, the following applies:

- the owner/handler of the dog must be a current financial member at the time of the event for that result to be eligible, and must be a member at the conclusion of the annual competition.
- the dog must be a purebred ANKC registered Alaskan Malamute and the dog's registered name and registration number must be included on the entry form.

In addition, to constitute an event in a class there must be a minimum of two (2) eligible competitors in that class. If there are less than two (2) eligible competitors in a weight category, no class award will be given, however that dog may still be eligible for the Top Weightpull Dog of the Year award. <u>Class Awards</u>: Class awards will be determined on the basis of a dog's highest three (3)\* weights pulled in that weight class out of the maximum five (5) eligible events\*. A dog that has competed in less than three (3) events is not excluded from eligibility for class awards. Annual awards will be provided for 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> place in each eligible weight class. In the event of a tie, a joint award will be provided. Top Weightpull Dog of the Year Award: The Top Weightpull Dog of the Year title will be awarded to that dog that has achieved the highest combined weight/weight ratio calculated from that dog's best three (3) results\* achieved in any of the weight classes from the five (5) eligible events\*. Results will be calculated to 2 (two) decimal places. In the event of a tie, a joint award will be provided. \*Subject to amendment if the event schedule changes. We'd really love to see lots of people and pooches, so put in your diary, come and have some fun!




NOTE: WALKERS MUST CARRY THEIR OWN BASIC FIRST AID ITEMS.

#### **AMCV Working Pack Dog Title\*:**

This backpacking day will be a qualifying event for the AMCV Working Pack Dog title and Associate Working Dog Certificate for dogs over 18 months of age only. The rules for the Working Pack Dog title are available from the Backpacking Co-ordinator.

You will require a sturdy backpack which is sufficiently large to hold the required weights. The weight should be made up of something that is dense yet can mould to the shape of your dog: bags of damp sand and/or a soft pack of water (similar to the bladder of a wine cask) are suitable. Anyone attempting a walk should also carry a backpack containing some basic first aid items (dog & human), food (dog & human), drink (dog & human), water bowl and wet weather gear (as the weather dictates).


Your dog must carry 30% of its body weight for a minimum of 16 km for a walk to count towards the title - a dog weighing 40 kg would therefore have to carry 12 kg of weight, which is the equivalent of 12 litres of water. This is too much weight for an untrained and/or unfit dog to be expected to carry. Obviously you will need to train your dog, gradually adding more weight, before you can consider tackling the full load, and your dog will need to be fit and in excellent physical condition.

The only decrease in the weight carried by the dog on a backpacking trip may be by NORMAL consumption of food or water by your dog. What your dog doesn't drink must get poured back into the container he is carrying, and the final pack weight must be no less than 75% of the initial pack weight.

**\*NOTE:** this is NOT a qualifying event for the ANKC title program.

#### Alaskan Malamute Breeder Prosecuted

Members may recall being informed several years ago of a threat of legal action against the AMCV unless we removed our Hip Dysplasia Program and information from our website. That threat was made by an unregistered breeder, Peter Dykstra, who traded in Queensland under the name "Sandown Alaskan Malamutes", because our website was costing him puppy sales. We refused Mr Dykstra's demands, and engaged in an exchange of correspondence in which we provided citations of many scientific studies to refute his insistence there was no genetic component in Hip Dysplasia.

Following numerous complaints from purchasers, the Queensland Office of Fair Trading launched an investigation into Dykstra's conduct. They subsequently laid 9 charges against both Mr Peter Dykstra, and his wife, Mrs Faith Dykstra, of Misrepresentation regarding Hip Dysplasia, its cause, and puppies they'd bred and sold.

The exchange of correspondence between your Club and Mr Dykstra formed part of the evidence presented to the Court by the Prosecution, and a member of your Committee was summonsed to appear (by telephone) as a witness for the Prosecution. We are pleased to be told that evidence, as well as our involvement and the evidence we could provide, played a role, not only in achieving a result, but in supporting and assisting those who were unfortunate enough to have purchased puppies from Sandown, only to have significant and avoidable health issues develop later.

The Dykstra's were found guilty of all charges and fined \$14,000.00 and \$7,000.00 respectively, and are the subject of additional non punitive orders, detailed below.

Sandown were known to have shipped puppies all over the country, including into Victoria. If you purchased a puppy from them, that has recurring or long term health problems, please read the below information.

# Gympie breeder gone to the dogs

17 September 2015

Two Gympie dog breeders were yesterday (16 September 2015) ordered to pay \$22,143.35 in fines and compensation by the Gympie Magistrates Court after being charged by the Office of Fair Trading (OFT) for making false and misleading claims about their dogs.

Peter and Faith Dykstra, trading as Sandown Alaskan Malamutes, were each found guilty on seven counts, and pleaded guilty to a further two counts, of engaging in misleading conduct in connection with the sale of goods, an offence under the Australian Consumer Law (ACL). The sale of pets is captured under the ACL which means businesses must not make false claims about their characteristics.

Mr Dykstra was fined \$14,000 and ordered to pay \$1,143.35 in compensation to a consumer affected by their offending. Mrs Dykstra was fined \$7,000 for the same offences under parity principals.

The court heard that between October 2011 and December 2013, Mr and Mrs Dykstra sold Alaskan Malamute dogs to consumers, several of whom later complained to the OFT after the dogs developed symptoms of a genetic condition known as hip dysplasia.

The OFT investigation found Mr and Mrs Dykstra misled the consumers by claiming the condition was not genetic. They instead blamed the consumers for causing any ill health conditions by providing an incorrect diet.

In January 2014, Mr and Mrs Dykstra advertised in a local newspaper claiming their breeding program was '15 years free of genetic defects', despite being informed of numerous instances of dogs purchased from them having hip dysplasia. The Malamute puppies were sold to consumers for between \$800 and \$1000.

The defendants did not test their breeding stock for genetic conditions.

Several scientific studies confirm hip dysplasia has a genetic component. Mr and Mrs Dykstra were provided this information in July 2011 by an Alaskan Malamute club in Victoria, several months prior to their first offence. Mr and Mrs Dykstra are not registered with any Alaskan Malamute breeders clubs.

In sentencing, the court considered Mr and Mrs Dykstra's motive in justifying selling dogs with genetic defects as having a wilful disregard for scientific facts and lack of responsibility when making representations to the community. The court also ordered Mr and Mrs Dykstra to issue a public apology and provide written notice to prospective buyers, at least 48 hours prior to sale, stating that their breeding stock was not screened for hip dysplasia.

Fair Trading Acting Executive Director Sharon Simmers said the outcome was a reminder that although most consumers don't think of pets as goods, the law still provides protection.

"As well as the financial cost, there is often a significant emotional investment for a consumer buying a pet," Ms Simmers said.

"Consumers who rely on information from a supplier about a particular breed, or an individual animal's lineage and medical history, are entitled to expect that information will not be false or misleading.

"The law applies equally to all traders, regardless of the goods or services being sold."

Buying from a puppy mill or an unregistered breeder only means that more well-deserving pets end up not having a home and puppy mills will keep on mass producing living creatures who deserve to be treated better than just a product in an unregulated factory.

The last and final snow race is the long running Dinner Plain Sled Dog Challenge and once again the Mally teams were out in force with First Alaskan Malamute team going to; Ash Blackwood in the 2 Dog Class, Rod Murphy in the 3 Dog Class (running Beth McCombe's team), E'vette Levett in the 4 Dog Class, Merv Turner in the 6 Dog Class and Ryan Cooling in the 8 Dog Class. This year there were 8 teams in the 8 Dog Class and notably two of them were full Mally teams and one had a pair of Mally's in wheel. At one stage of the race their were 16 Alaskan Malamutes passing side by side with no issues which is a huge testament to the training, skills of the mushers and excellent temperaments of the dogs.





# Alaskan Malamute Rehoming Aide Australia Inc (AMRAA)

AMRAA is a rescue organisation based in NSW, ACT, VIC and SA. Our focus is saving Alaskan Malamutes from pounds and rehoming them to loving families in forever homes. We also advertise Mallies from other organisations and some private surrenders on our Facebook page. In addition to Malamutes, we also rescue Huskies, Akitas, Samoyeds and their crosses.

The teams in ACT, VIC and SA rely solely on the assistance of foster carers to house the dogs in care and we always need more people to open their homes and hearts to dogs in need. Our NSW team is a bit different, due to the sheer volume of dogs in need. The majority of the dogs are housed at a private boarding facility which obviously causes a great drain on financial resources. Currently there are approximately 45 dogs in care in NSW, and 10 of these are in foster care. Throughout the other states, we have another 30 dogs.

Last financial year, we had 101 dogs come into New South Wales, spending an average of 4 months each in care. Of these dogs, 83 were rehomed, 10 were on trial in new homes, 3 were transferred to another rescue and 3 passed away. In Victoria, we had 68 dogs in care, 17 of which were private surrenders and 8 were private rehomings. Of the 68 dogs, 48 were rehomed. South Australia had 18 dogs come into care, all of which were rehomed.

We are always in need of financial donations to help with kennel fees, veterinary care, transportation and other ongoing needs. # **Doggy Breath - Dental Care Month**

The best defense is prevention. Having dental check-ups, and regular professional cleaning is paramount.

"Pet Insurance Australia offers teeth cleaning cover under its Routine Care package as preventing dental disease is an important aspect in responsible pet ownership," Nadia Crighton says.

Signs of dental disease

- Bad breathe
- Staining on teeth
- Bleeding gums
- Excessive salivation


