Are you welcoming a puppy into your family?



It's such a momentous time when you're welcoming a gorgeous ball of fluff into your world, as we all know they will eventually grow up and become a best friend to your entire family.

At the beginning of your new relationship with your puppy there is so much to learn about nutrition and training. Growing puppies need a higher proportion of protein in their diet than adult dogs, ideally provided by a ration of balanced fresh meat.

An excellent way to train your puppy is to start with great habits from a young age. Especially early socialisation with many different dogs (all sizes and breeds), including different people and environments, as it's important for young pups to learn social manners and tolerance.

Perfect Puppy Training Tips:

- Begin with basics; keep training sessions short and focused, no longer than 15 minutes. Puppies have short attention spans.
- Teach them their name, how to sit, stay, come and heel, and make sure your puppy receives consistent messages from everyone in the family to avoid confusion.
- Socialise your pup early. The first 16 weeks is the best time to start getting them familiar with other dogs and humans.
- Attend puppy classes, or puppy training schools, taught by trained dog instructors.
- Use positive reinforcement always acknowledge good behaviour. Praise and reward your dog when you receive the desired outcome, and it's generally best to ignore any unwanted behaviour.
- Make sure you use healthy treats as a reward. Many pet treats are full of salt and sugar so choose wisely.

Remember, overall please be patient and relaxed, but confident. Dogs are pack animals; your pup needs to know who's in charge.



How to Properly Fit a Dog Collar



Ensuring your dog's collar fits well is an important part of pet safety.

A dog collar that is too tight can be more than just uncomfortable, it can be dangerous to their health. A dog collar that is too tight can restrict the airway and make it difficult for the dog to breathe, it can also cause chaffing or cut the dog's neck.

A dog collar that is too loose may slip off the dog during a walk and allow the dog to run into dangerous traffic or get lost. A loose collar also poses a risk for getting caught on furniture, trees and bushes or fences which can trap or accidentally suffocate your dog.

To make sure your dog's collar fits right: measure high around your dog's neck with a soft measuring tape and add an inch. Measuring around the upper part of your dog's neck ensures the collar won't be loose enough to slip off over their

A dog collar should fit comfortably with about the thickness of two fingers for wiggle room.

As your dog grows or fluctuates in weight you will want to make sure to regularly check the fit of their collar. If you found that it's no longer a good fit, replace it.



Vanessa Brotto

Vanessa Brotto (nee Kaltenbock) of Arcticmal Kennels in Victoria passed away after valiantly battling cancer. She produced lovely dogs under the Arcticmal prefix and was influential in bringing the Finnish Lapphund to Australia.



She helped many breeders through her business 'Dogs in Motion' shipping semen around the globe. Vanessa was a member of the AMCV for many years, serving on Committee as Treasurer and Puppy Registrar in the late 1990s and 2000s.



Steve Burger

Steve Burger of Runningdog Alaskan Malamutes in South Australia passed away suddenly and unexpectedly on 10 August after suffering an aneurism. Steve and his wife Lin produced

Natalie Norris

Natalie Norris passed away on August 28, 2016 in her home in Willow, Alaska.

Born in Lake Placid on Jan. 24, 1922, to John Chester and Edgarita Jubin, Natalie demonstrated her passion for sled dogs at an early age. One of her first memories was watching Jacques Suzanne drive his dogs past her house on Mirror Lake. As a 6-year-old child, she befriended a stray dog and taught him how to "gee" and "haw" around the puddles and rocks on the village streets. By 13, Natalie was racing a five-dog team in a snowstorm in the Adirondacks. While other dog drivers got lost or didn't finished the race, Natalie casually crossed the finish line. She had shown stamina and perseverance that would be one of her lifetime hallmarks. At 15, she acquired her own team of malamutes from Dr. d'Avignon's kennel.

In 1939, Natalie sold five of her dogs to the United States Antarctic Service Expedition, 1939-1941, under the command of Admiral Byrd, and when the U.S. military recruited sled dogs to be trained for rescuing soldiers during World War II, she sold many of her dogs to the Army.



After graduating from Syracuse University, Natalie set her sights on Alaska. She travelled by train cross-country with seven malamutes and two Siberian huskies to Seattle, where they boarded a ship sailing the outside passage to Seward. Arriving in Anchorage in June 1946, Natalie was met by Earl Norris, who had offered to board her dogs at his homestead. A match made in heaven, Earl and Natalie married a year later.

While Earl had co-founded the Fur Rendezvous World Championship Sled Dog Race in 1946, Natalie was the first woman to run it in 1947. Two years later she ran the race again, coming in second. When the Norrises decided to focus on breeding registered Siberian huskies based on the dog's performance in harness, they laid the foundations of the now world-famous Alaskans of Anadyr Siberian husky kennel. Earl and Natalie continued their enthusiasm for breeding and racing sled dogs and were influential in forming the Alaska Sled Dog Racing Association and the

Siberian Husky Club of Anchorage. In the 1950s, Natalie became a judge for the American Kennel Club and later travelled the world observing thousands of dogs at various dog shows. In the 1970s Natalie won the Women's North American Championship in Fairbanks, Alaska.

As the city of Anchorage grew, the Norrises moved to Willow, Alaska. Although the Siberian husky was the mainstay of the Anadyr kennels, Natalie continued to own Alaskan malamutes, the breed she began with in Lake Placid. Always a gracious and willing mentor, Natalie helped many young people interested in mushing. She also shared her knowledge about the malamute and Siberian husky by authoring many articles in local, national and international journals and magazines.

Natalie was preceded in her death by her husband Earl, her brother Jack and her sister Dorothy.

She is survived by her brother Arthur Jubin of Lake Placid; sons John Paul and Theodore of Willow; daughter Edgarita of Louisville, Kentucky; several grandchildren; and many dogs.

One of Natalie's fondest activities was having a spring picnic with friends and their dog teams at the end of the winter season. The yearly picnic in Willow will be dedicated in the spring of 2017 in her honour and to her memory.



Ask A Vet: Why Does My Dog Stare At Me When He Poops?

You may have noticed that your dog keeps his eyes on you while he is defecating. It is not because he is embarrassed. He is not wishing you would look away or give him privacy while he "does his business". It goes much deeper than that. Dogs are animals and they are very tuned in to their environment and their own place in it. For survival, they must be aware of risk.

Defecation is one of the times in an animal's life when he is at his most vulnerable. He must posture to perform the task and because of this, he is not in a position to readily fight or flee. In fact, it would be rather difficult for him to defend himself or to escape danger while he is eliminating. Your dog is instinctively aware of his defenselessness.



But your dog also knows that she is a part of your "pack". You are a member of the family group. If your dog watches you during this time, it is because she is depending on you to give her a body language signal or "heads up" if she should be afraid. She may also be looking to you to possibly defend her should the need arise. If you suddenly leap away, you can bet your dog will respond also.

Likewise, some dogs will not defecate with anyone watching (or on a leash). Perhaps he feels safer if he is away from your home turf where he will not draw attention. Instincts dictate your dog's reaction to his own helplessness during this awkward time.

Whether your dog looks to you or slips away for "poop time", it helps to know that she is just doing what comes naturally to her. You should honor her wishes as long as it is safe to do so. Try not to do anything that will startle her if she is looking at you while she defecates. Respect her natural inclination to be away and modify your environment to accommodate her as much as possible.

Ask a Vet:

Is It Safe To Take My Dog Running With Me?

Many people these days find running to be a great way to keep in shape and they wonder if they can take their dog along. Veterinarians and physicians alike agree that exercise is a wonderful way to maintain health, both mental and physical. If you want to take your dog along on your runs there are a few things you should consider.

How rigorous are your runs? Make sure you are not asking too much of your dog who may not be as conditioned for the challenge as you are. Avoid taking your dog on a full length run without allowing him time to build up his strength and stamina. Start with short runs and see how he does. Make sure he seems to enjoy the exercise as much as you do.

Is he a very young dog? Excessive stress on the joints of a growing animal is not a good idea. If your dog is still a puppy, especially a large breed puppy who has a lot of growing to do, it might be a better idea to keep the distance shorter and

build up the demand required by the run after he is skeletally mature. You can start increasing the demand gradually after he is approximately 8 to 9 months old. Remember to stay tuned in to your dog and never push him past his point of exhaustion.

Consider the physical conditions of the run. Is it hot? Is the footing rough? Don't forget your dog doesn't have running shoes so consider the wear and sensitivity of his foot pads. Hot pavement is a bad idea. If you have a very small breed dog, remember the number of steps she must take in order to keep up with your lengthy strides.

The most important consideration for allowing your dog to accompany you on long distance runs is probably whether or not your dog is healthy enough for such a physical demand. Ask your veterinarian if he or she thinks it is safe for your dog. Together you can come up with a plan to account for any issues your dog might have and to gradually build up your dog strength and stamina so that the exercise is enjoyable for you both.

Alaska Calling

The very first time I raced in the 4 dog class, was the very first time I had put those particular three dogs together. It might have been the first time I'd put any three dogs together. And I was woefully under prepared for running at night. My lights were almost nonexistent. Other mushers helped out as much they could, from memory, James Ganson, Jon de Lacy and Stuart Vanderpol helped out, but available lights back then weren't that flash, and I ended up with just enough light to see the dogs and not much else.

In what may not have been my brightest parenting moment, I decided to take my son, Thomas, along with me on the rig, just in case something happened, and I needed someone to hold the rig. He was, I think, 7 or 8 years old.

Our start was hardly auspicious. The start chute was located on a bend, and as we left the chute, the track curved away to the left. My team ploughed straight ahead, completely ignoring the track. Rob Davey leapt from behind the chute to grab my leaders and drag them back on track, while Thomas yelled at him to stop, we'd left the chute and he wasn't allowed to help. It was against the Rules!





Ten minutes later, the dogs regained some confidence, and broke into a gallop. We were zooming! Alas, the track curved to the right, and the dogs headed into a clearing on the left. The leaders reacted to my crazed screaming at the very last minute and turned sharp right, right across a massive old gum tree on the very edge of the track. The wheel dog turned sharp left, to avoid hitting the tree. The rig responded perfectly to my panicked driving and smashed head first into the tree.

Both Thomas and I flew out of the rig and landed heavily, ending up with bruising that lasted for months. Of course, we picked ourselves up, made sure the dogs were ok, and went on our way, Thomas asking me not to go too fast this time.

A month later, I talked Thomas into coming out on a training run. A two dog team, a short run on a scooter, just near home, what could go wrong, right? A kangaroo crossed the track just in front of the team, causing them to come to almost a complete stop in shock, before screaming after the roo. Of course, we had an immediate wheel wrap, and once again, Thomas and I were flying

over handle bars. I wondered whether I'd ever get him back into sledding again.

But, despite my accident prone approach, he was still keen. After a little while. And it wasn't long before he was insisting he could run pee wees without me. An enduring memory is a trip to Mount Margaret, when he was 9 or 10, and he ran a 2 dog team on a sled, by himself. Somehow, in what seemed like a few minutes, he was old enough to run in juniors. And then, he was old enough to race in 1 dog, and he was hassling me for a dog to run. He really wanted to race in the 2 dog class, but I insisted he had to start in 1 dog, just like everyone else. There was never any doubt about his ability to pilot a team past other teams. I simply didn't want to lose 2 dogs out of my own team!



Three years ago, he made it clear he wanted a larger team to run. So we set about building a three dog team for him. He's been training dogs and dog teams with me for years. So he was confident he could manage a larger team. And so was I.

He's spoken many times about wanting to travel to Alaska. And when we were at Boot camp earlier this year with Curt & Fleur Perano, Fleur encouraged him to look further into it. So he did. We found North American racing kennels advertising for handlers on the website Sleddog Central, and made a short list. He then emailed six kennels. As a result, he was offered handler positions at four different kennels.



On the 17th September, he flew out of Tullamarine, bound for Vancouver, and a second flight to Whitehorse. His ultimate destination was Tagish Lake Kennels, on the shores of Tagish Lake, home to Iditarod and Yukon Quest veteran mushers Michelle Phillips and Ed Hopkins. There, he helps look after over fifty Alaskan Husky's. His duties include everything from picking up poop, to feeding, to helping harness the team Michelle has entered in the 2017 Iditarod. Immersed in everyday life there, he's helped slaughter and butcher turkeys and chickens, stock piling food for the winter, gets to play with puppies, and ride the ATV behind sixteen powerful canine athletes. And he's getting to experience a Canadian Autumn while living in a yurt, a round, single room cabin.

Will he get to Alaska? That is yet to be seen. We hope so. The plan is, maybe, return for another winter next year and hopefully run in some Iditarod qualifying races, with a view to one day, maybe... well, we'll see. Michelle Phillips has entered several other well known races, including the Copper Basin 300. We'll enjoy following Thomas's adventures between now and when he returns home, at the end of March. 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BEHAVIOUR ADVICE FOR CANINE CAR SICKNESS

You can see the look on your dog's face, the panting, the long shoelaces of drool hanging from the corners of their mouth, they are hunching over... and then you notice the smell. It's happened, your dog has vomited again. And it's getting worse. This time they'd only been in the car a minute or two! Car sickness is a common, distressing and unpleasant problem for both pet parents and dogs. There's the mess and the smell to deal with and car sickness can escalate to the point where some dogs will defecate in the car as well. I've been in the position to be called upon to help many a dog with car sickness and developed a protocol in response, which has had good success. It is definitely easier to address in puppies, but adult dogs can benefit from intervention too. There are a number of physical and behavioural reasons why dogs develop and continue to have car sickness.



WHEN THE PROBLEM IS PHYSICAL...

Some of the physical reasons why car sickness occurs are - weak stomachs that are prone to nausea, poor balance, lack of access to fresh air or ability to focus the eye on a point of horizon and having a full belly from a recent meal or drink. These physical causes can be easily tackled.

Better timing of feeding and drinks before a trip will assist dogs with weak or full stomachs. Allowing food or water should be done well ahead for better digestion.

Nausea can also be improved by providing fresh air through a window.

Providing a spot where they are able to sit and look at a point of horizon improves balance and reduces nausea, although not all dogs take this option when available to them. Poor balance which is related to poor sensory perception or integration can be improved by doing shorter trips to develop this skill. Many an owner makes the mistake of making their dog's early car trips far too long. If your first car trips are going to be long then make sure you make frequent toilet and stretch stops. Sensory perception and integration can also be improved over time through doing agility type exercises, which will lead to increased tolerance to motion. Rarely, some dogs are sick from visual over stimulation and they need to be kept settled by a harness, crate or a position on the floor so they can't see. When the problem is physical, this is when it is useful to go to your vet for therapeutic assistance. Your vet can prescribe "Metronidazole" - a medication that acts on the sphincter muscles at the top of the stomach, reducing the queasy feeling leading to vomiting (which is the same medication given to people with gastro to reduce vomiting). While "Metronidazole" is prescribed often, if sphincter control isn't the issue - it isn't going to help.

A natural option to reduce nausea is "NAS TravelEze". Rarely some dogs have physical anomalies such as an internal organ that presses on the stomach causing the dog to feel sick. These anomalies are hard to diagnose, the surgery is usually radical and expensive and it may have little to no impact.

THE DRUGS APPROACH...

Drugs are often prescribed to treat behavioural problems. Some of the drugs that are prescribed when dogs present with car sickness are *Xanax* (used for people who suffer panic attacks) and "ACP" (Acepromazine) which sedates, so they cannot act out (and the dog is awake but immobile, and potentially still stressed). These act on the dog within a short period of time and remain temporarily in the dog's system.

Neither usually has a great impact on the long-term improvement of the behaviour.

A word of caution. Beware if your dog's stress only presents when travelling in the car but they are prescribed ongoing antianxiety medication such as *Prozac*, *Clomicalm or Reconcile*. That is akin to using a post hole driver when a hammer will do! Any drug that is prescribed for a behavioural purpose should never be dispensed on its own without a behavioural modification program.

Drugs are intended only as a bridge, to help get over the hump and are not meant as a permanent solution. If don't believe this, then read thoroughly the insert that comes with the medication and if they don't give you one then ask for it! "Adaptil" is another option. It is a synthetic pheromone that mimics the pheromone bitches produce to calm their puppies — although I haven't seen astounding or definitive results, particularly with car sickness. A natural behavioural drug alternative is "Bach Flowers Rescue Remedy".

When the problem is behavioural - the most success I've seen success with is through rehabilitation. In my 18 years experience including as a veterinary nurse, predominantly I've seen behavioural training have greater success over "drug" interventions.

WHEN THE DRUGS DON'T WORK...

If you have tried these measures and you are still dealing with a dog being sick, then the problem is in their head — literally. **Their behaviour has become a conditioned (learned) response**. The tell tale sign of "learned sickness" is when your

dog is showing signs of sickness earlier and earlier, to the point you have barely driven anywhere or the car isn't started. All too often I have heard this from pet parents and unfortunately that key information is not red flagged when it should be ,and the focus turns to physical causes and/or drugs to control the behaviour. Learned behaviours can be unlearned.

Although being sick may have physical origins, once your dog connects car rides with feeling nauseated they become understandably highly anxious at the thought of going for another car trip. Negative anticipation sets in.

The fear of becoming sick produces its own nausea and is worse than the car ride itself, so they vomit again then they feel better for it - and a nasty biologically self-rewarding pattern has been established.

This learned pattern of anxious anticipation gets stronger and stronger with each time the dog is sick until just the thought of going in the car elicits stress, then nausea, then vomiting. It is at this point when you will see the dog pulling back from

getting in the car, or crouching and panting and drooling as soon as they are placed in the car. In this situation, tending to the physical causes of sickness will help, but the learned pattern (stress and vomiting) must be unlearned.

WHEN THE PROBLEM IS BEHAVIOURAL...

It took time for this behaviour to develop, and it is going to take time to undo.

For younger puppies this can be undone in a week or two. For older dogs it can take 2-3 months. I've had 5 rescue dogs over 5 months of age with this problem.

Three had no sickness after one month and the other two took a full three months to completely recover. In dispensing this advice through thousands of puppy schools, I've had countless puppy parents remedy it quickly. I've also had success with much older dogs, that is when the owners as much as possible implement the strategies below.

To unlearn this response you are going to need strategy, time and patience. The sooner you implement these interventions the better, as the longer it goes on the greater the learned response is. This may involve some deliberate "training" trips designed to help your dog. You may also need to get yourself some toys or treats, and if your dog has a favourite friend (dog or person) this will especially assist in the process.

Renee's sage car sickness behaviour saving protocol... HOW TO UNLEARN CAR SICKNESS...

Step 1: Hop in the car and don't go anywhere. Don't even turn the engine on. Just play and do fun things (easy for puppies). Use toys, balls, treats and patting – what ever your dog likes. If you have another dog that really loves the car then they can help your dog get caught up in the excitement and have a positive experience in the car. Make the initial repetitions super short* and then let them out of the car and have a good ol' play and run around. Save their favourite activity for when they get out of the car... like they have reached an awesome destination. Do several repetitions until there is less resistance or improvement through being more relaxed, and then give it a rest. Then repeat the process again. Increase the time of the repetitions as you go until they can happily be in the car without signs of sickness or distress.

*Super short means no longer than a minute. Even 20-30 seconds will do.

Step 2: Now turn the engine on, and don't go anywhere. Return to doing very short repetitions. Continue to do fun things. If your dog wants to lay down and settle, that's fine too – just as long as they aren't cowering and showing signs of stress or sickness. And again save the best, most fun reward until they get out of the car at their "destination". Do super short repetitions then have a break, and then repeat the process again until they are easing into it and familiar with the concept. Then increase the time of the repetitions.

Step 3: Take a very short trip — down the driveway or down a few doors to the neighbours. This is when meeting up with a playmate is really helpful. If you have a neighbour, friend or relative nearby with a friendly well trained dog that you can tee up) - take them just down the road in the car and let them get out and have a splendid play (that is if your dog likes other dogs; if not, you will have to sub for toys, games, treats or their favourite person. Logically don't use treats if vomiting is going to follow). Have a break and repeat this process several times until they are easing into it and familiar with the concept.

Step 4: Take a short trip for a few minutes to somewhere fun like the local park or dog school or a relative's house (if

they are safe fun places). You may need to be smart, if you don't have somewhere to take them, then you will have to organise one. Perhaps set up a pooch playschool somewhere that friends and family can bring friendly safe dogs to play with. Again substitute some other sort of fun if you cannot introduce them to a dog that they would love to play with.

You will notice your dog is unlearning to be sick in the car when it either doesn't show signs of stress and nausea or, shows signs of willingness and even enthusiasm to get in the car. This means, they've learned the car represents a kind freedom and a wormhole to fun experiences. Nausea will go once stress has diminished. They key is to replace the stress for pleasure.

A word about your short trips – these will help build up your

A word about your short trips – these will help build up your dog's tolerance to motion as well as establish a happy relationship with the car.

- Don't take your dog for long car rides if you can help it,
 even if it is coming home from the breeders, taking them to
 the vets or puppy school, as this can accidently establish or
 reinforce the behaviour. And if you must then allow for
 frequent stops and play breaks. Often owners don't realise
 that those early long car rides are having an effect on their
 dog's behaviour.
- You must, to the best of your ability avoid them becoming sick. Any vomits can increase the likelihood of it occurring again.
- What is a "long ride" for a dog? If they are sick it was too
 long for them and you will need to do shorter trips. And if
 you must take them for a long trip then you should be doing
 many of these shorter/mini training trips before and in
 between to break the pattern.
- It goes without saying that training your dog is going to benefit them immensely. It is more difficult to modify behaviour in an untrained dog that you don't have an established relationship with. The trust, leadership and communication you build through training can assist greatly when your dog is looking for guidance.
- Be careful not to unintentionally reward unwanted behaviour by trying to ease their suffering through patting and praising them, it will not make them feel better – but the positive attention they receive at this time can reinforce that feeling sick or being stressed is appropriate and rewarding or it can send the wrong message that there IS something to worry about.
- Never punish or reprimand your dog for feeling or being sick. It is not their fault, and because it is out of their control you can induce further anxiety. Do better reading of the situation next time and take appropriate preventative action.
